

The admission capacity has already increased from 1550 to 2050 per year. Post-graduate seats have been doubled.


Recently Gujarat Government has taken actions to start new medical colleges. Seven new medical colleges with a total admission capacity of 1050 are at various stages of completion or planning.

So in a few years, the medical admission capacity would be comparable to that of Tamil Nadu currently.



So we need to look at total health workforce density


And their distribution in terms of rural-urban and backward areas





But what about doctors in public sector?

State	Gujarat	Tamil Nadu	India
Population Served per Doctor	1300	800	1532
Population Served per Doctor in government	19000	9000	

Specialists are in serious short supply in public sector in Gujarat.

What about Ayush Doctors?

There were nearly 34000 Ayush Doctors, one serving an average population of 1660.

Compared to about 43000 allopathic doctors, one serving an average population of 1300.


Do we have adequate number of doctors?

Perhaps yes. As economy develops, there would be a need for more doctors.

To improve health, however, we need to pay attention to health workforce, its rural-urban distribution.

Need to pay more attention to nursing staff and role of Ayush doctors.

Competency for what?


The NRHM task force on medical education says:

About two-thirds of the fresh graduates felt that their skills in medicine needed improvement for them to operate independently; about 30% of the graduates expressed lack of confidence in functioning at the primary care level.

The Task Force makes several recommendations about curriculum, internship, and for enhancing skill development.

Also there is a plan for rural doctors.

There is no single path to skill enhancement



Skill Enhancement

Quality of medical institutions

- Need for better accreditation process
- Faculty development: training for teaching skills, use of information and communication technology for education and telemedicine

Continuous professional development made more attractive and need based; designed by the practitioners themselves

Clinical excellence: provide guidance on promoting good health and preventing and treating ill health

Are they sufficiently competent: Skill Enhancement

Difficult to say. No significant evidence that they are not. There is no single path to skills enhancement. Much is said but little is done.

A profession is not merely an occupation of highly learned and skilled technicians. It also includes a strong and inseparable moral commitment.....

Ethics Enhancement

Just like skills, there is no single path to enhancing ethical behavior

Ethics Enhancement

Some thoughts

- Reduce cost of entry to medical colleges (rent seeking behavior)
- Selection of medical students
- What to tell Junior doctors about ethics? (their socialization)
- Law is not sufficient protection, professional norms are important.

Social Mission

- Providing services in underserved areas
- Enhanced emphasis on prevention
- Public health orientation

More doctors should embrace leadership roles if Gujarat is to excel in medical care

Profession should take control of its destiny otherwise somebody else will.
